About Camp Erin®

Camp Erin® Philadelphia is a **free**, weekend bereavement camp for youth who are grieving the death of a significant person in their lives. Children and teens ages 6 to 17 attend a weekend camp experience that combines grief education and emotional support with fun, traditional camp activities. Led by bereavement professionals and caring volunteers, campers are provided a safe environment to explore their grief, learn essential coping skills, and make friends with peers who are also grieving.

Who Can Attend?

- Open to youth ages 6-17 who have experienced the death of a significant person in their lives
- Recommended minimum of 6 months from date of death
- Military families are especially encouraged to attend

What Are The Activities?

- Traditional camp activities (arts & crafts, games, campfires, etc.)
- Grief related support activities (music, art, circle time, memorial services, etc.)
- Development of new coping skills

When Is The Camp?

- Early June each year
- Activities begin on Friday afternoon and end Sunday, midday
- Programing for Parents and Guardians at the open and close of the Camp weekend

Where Is The Camp?

- Montgomery County, Pennsylvania
- Camp families must arrange their own transportation

How Do I Apply?

Parents or Guardians must complete an online application for each child who would like to attend.

Applications are available on our website in January of each year.
